- Agrichemical containers and drums
- Used motor oil
- Unwanted agrichemicals
- Seed, feed, and fertiliser bags

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW!

You can recycle or dispose of:

- ✓ **Empty agrichemical containers and drums from participating brand owners – Free**
 - Must be triple-rinsed and free from residue inside and out, with lids removed.
- ✓ **Unwanted and unused agricultural chemicals**
 - Must be booked individually using the online registration system as Agrecovery requires specific product details.
 - Free for legacy (district specific, dependent on funding) and levy funded agrichemicals for volumes less than 150 litres total.
 - Must be transported in containers that are not damaged, leaking or split and segregated properly.
- ✓ **Waste oil from agricultural users - Free**
 - This can be dropped off on the day in containers less than 20L in size.
- ✓ **Woven polypropylene bags e.g seed, fertiliser & feed bags – Free**
 - Free of any fertiliser residue and minimum external contamination such as mud and grass.
 - Bundled inside a seed, fertiliser or feed bag and not loose.

Got too much to bring in?

For large volumes or difficult to transport items, on-farm collection can be arranged. Call 0800 247 326.

Booking is essential

Book ALL items for disposal through the Agrecovery website. Only those who book can participate - and it's first in first served. **So be quick, there are less than 200 spots available.** The booking system will provide further details on what waste is included, what you need to do before bringing it in - and where to bring it! You will need to become a member of Agrecovery and be from within the catchment area to participate.

Nationwide push to clear more farm waste

The project builds upon previous trial events, and seeks alternatives to burning, burying or stockpiling of rural waste by providing reliable and cost-efficient recovery programmes.
