After an indifferent summer and autumn in which 20 of the days at Pukeiti were wet - and many of the fine days miserable - and even though the downpours experienced by many throughout the country skirted Pukeiti, the building progress has been hampered; but the end of the present construction phase is in sight.

The Rainforest Centre (formerly the Gatehouse) is on its way to completion. The broad sweeping entrance, to be enhanced by the Maori carvings shifted from the shelter below the Founders' Garden (also being redeveloped), leads into the new larger café space which extends beneath a covered canopy, the triangular steel girders of which stand tall

and dominate the building. They have the same outline as the roof of the Vireya House (formerly the Covered Walk) and like it, the roof will be glazed. Easy access will be provided from the Cafeteria to the upper level of the Vireya House and its basement will provide public toilets and a conference room to be called the Rata

Planting in the Vireya House continues and it is beginning to look comfortably furnished with a range of plants, the most important of which are of course the vireyas. The various leaf shapes on these plants are intriguing. Many were moved from the original house to the nursery and then brought back, while others - new plants propagated from the old - ensure the retention of the full collection. It will

take some time before these small plants reach the stature of the old parents and for the new house to have a mature feel. There are other aspects such as the pond and the water garden still to be completed but a visit now to see the progress is worthwhile.

These are not the only projects on which staff time has been focussed. The Misty Knoll has settled and is already a firm favourite with its volcano-like craters, one lined with red and pink azaleas, the other topped with white scented rhododendrons, and will continue to attract visitors. Thanks are due to the Lysart- Watt Trust for supporting this project. The sand-formed pathways have been extended, sensitively curved following contours

of the land, from the Hybrid Block through the Stead Block to the Keiller Garden. Even at the beginning of May the promise of this as a semi-formal garden that could be copied at home, quite different from the planting style of the rest of Pukeiti, is beginning to be fulfilled. Plants of Kniphofia 'Joy's Gold', Hydrangea paniculata 'Tardiva' and Helium 'Walstrand' add colour and the climbing hydrangeas and Virginia Creeper beginning to climb the framework of the 'house' add interest in the last days of autumn. It is a good place to sit and rest.

Along the main walks information panels have been strategically placed to signpost the adventures of plant explorers, particularly George Forrest, who collected many of the rhododendrons and introduced them into our gardens. One features the words of Graham Smith, Curator 1969-2008.

The treehouses have all been named and incorporate interpretative material

contributing to the education programme which is now a very important part of the TRC's plans. Some also support giant metal forest insects. Watching children explore the property, seeking each treehouse, and moving from one to the next has been a joy.

Away from the construction zone the staff have worked assiduously to ensure that the rest of the gardens along the main walks are in top condition - full marks to them.

These are not the end of the developments; others are just beginning. The basement of the old Lodge looks forlorn, but initial planning for its replacement is all but complete. Construction is included in this years' TRC Annual Plan. If approved, construction should begin later this year. The Pukeiti Board has approved a contribution of \$200,000 for the furnishing and fit-out of the Lodge which the Trust will continue to lease. Next year we will be in – the excitement builds!

The Rainforest Centre will be open for business this spring in time for the Garden Festival.

Lara Coxhead has worked diligently on digitising the total collection, not only the rhododendrons, using the Iris Programme, which replaced the BG Base Programme, and posting the information on our web-site www.pukeiti.org.com. This information can also be accessed

through the TRC site. At this site click on **Gardens**, then under 'Pukeiti' click on **Plant Hunters' Station** and when the next page appears click on **Go to Pukeiti Plant Hunters' Station** and then in the box that appears, name the plant or group that you wish to search. It will give you a description of the plant, where it can be found at Pukeiti, and the year of accession.

This is one of the first public gardens, anywhere, to make its plant collection details available through the web for all to access.

# THE 2016 END OF YEAR BBQ

Rain stopped the day – it poured and the event was postponed until early in the New Year.

The day in February was one of those seemingly rare fine days this summer. On a mild windless evening, members, reminded of the postponed event, gathered on the lawn at Tupare bringing a great selection of dishes - in line with the pot-luck Pukeiti tradition - to supplement the patties, sausages and steak barbequed to perfection by volunteers. The tables, suitably decorated, were set out on the lawn, which was fringed by maples, iconic plants at Tupare, and over-looked by the tall Liriodendron and Copper Beech planted when the garden was first developed by Sir Russell and Lady Matthews. Foundation members of Pukeiti, Tupare was their home for over 50 years and the gardens were for many years opened to the public each Labour Weekend, the proceeds being donated to Pukeiti. Sir Russell was a driving force during the establishment and early development of the Trust, travelling New Zealand to recruit members, and providing and encouraging financial support over many following years.

The BBQ was held at Tupare as facilities were unavailable at Pukeiti. It was a very successful occasion.

Our new secretary, Anne Howard, was introduced to members. Diane Jordan whom she replaced has served in the role with distinction, giving the Trust clear direction, being always willing to address issues, help members, maintain records and over-see financial matters. She is a great servant and friend of Pukeiti and has been for many years its face. Diane has not cut all links with the Trust and remains as minute secretary of the Members' Committee.

#### **AUTUMN MEETING**
